What is Beach Cities CAER?

- A non-profit public benefit organization, focused on providing a forum for increasing community engagement and awareness of the continuous improvement of coordinated fire department and industry emergency preparedness and response programs.
- BCC is a <u>team</u> of (20) public agency emergency management officials, fire departments, schools, refineries, manufacturing industries in the South Bay region aligned with the goal of enhancing public safety.
- BCC group meets once to twice per month developing educational flyers, website links, discuss upcoming legislation related to hazardous materials, fire department coordination and incidents

Brief History of CAER

- In 1985 the Chemical Manufacturers Association (CMA) developed the "Responsible Care" program as a <u>recommended</u> best practice in response to major industry accidents (1984 Bhopal, India).
 - CAER (<u>Community Awareness and Emergency Response</u>) became the code of management practices, initially focused only on <u>emergency response</u> and then expanded to <u>facility = community dialogue to cover safety</u>, <u>health and environmental</u> <u>issues</u>.
- In 1986 U.S. Congress enacted Superfund Amendments also known as the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA)
 - Required a significant level of drill coordination between local fire departments, emergency planning committees, regulators and industry
 - Mandated improvements in emergency preparedness, response, and community awareness of facilities hazardous materials inventories

The History of Beach Cities and South Bay CAER

- 1990-2000 originally two CAER groups; (BCC) El Segundo and Torrance / (SBC) Carson and Wilmington (once per-month meetings included industry, fire agencies, schools)
- 2000 the two groups merged in response to EPA's Risk Management Plan (RMP)
 - Required public outreach regarding a facilities worst-case chemical / explosion scenario
 - Combined CAER group developed public surveys, training video, held public meetings
- 2005-2007 in response to a major power outage, SCAQMD asked CAER to help industry and the community develop a refinery flare outreach document
- 2010-2018 CAER groups nearly dissolved (due to agency / industry downsizing, and reassignments)
- 2018-2021 in response to new regulatory requirements and changing demographics, the group reunited as Beach Cities CAER. Serving the region from El Segundo / Torrance to Carson-Wilmington-San Pedro
