

Housing: Principles for Legislation

- The state should allow local jurisdictions to meet housing targets in ways cities will determine how to reduce VMT, congestion, air pollutants and GHG emissions.
- In auto-dependent, transit poor neighborhoods, housing development will not just add density but also congestion and pollutants. Proposed legislation should require developers of buildings with 4 units or more to submit a ZE Mobility Plan to the local jurisdiction that demonstrates how its occupants will travel without consuming fossil fuels.
- State mandated development strategy violates principles of participatory democracy. State mandates public participation in GP and zoning ordinances and proposed legislation will over-ride those local policies with a one size fits all strategy.
- The housing policies in the pipeline benefit speculators and developers as well as lead to gentrification of our most vulnerable neighborhoods.



Housing: Principles for Legislation

- Growth targets should consider carrying capacity of the infrastructure water, sewers, etc.
- Learn lessons from COVID 19 many jobs do not require being on site.
- City policies are not responsible for unaffordability of housing. Affordable housing is:
 - Difficult to build on land that is not affordable
 - Comes with a high cost of land, construction materials and labor
 - Is exacerbated by grossly unequal income distribution. There are twice as many vacant units as homeless people in LA City
- Allow cities to investigate reducing the cost of existing housing and the housing to be vacated from the upcoming silver tsunami
- The Smart Growth strategy will not produce the aspirational housing volume nor the VMT reductions in the South Bay. It will in fact reduce the quality of life.

South Bay Fiber Network

- SBFN IS OPERATIONAL!
- Lateral Construction Continues:
 - 22 sites are now connected to the network
 - On pace for connecting 36 sites by Spring '21
- \$6.9 Million from SBCCOG's Measure M
 Subregional funds are being used for capital costs
- Participating agencies:
 - all 15 cities, BCHD, Lundquist (BioMed) Institute, SBWIB, LA Metro, LA County DPW, West Basin Municipal Water District
- Minimum service \$1000/mo for 1 gigabit.
- Applications are being developed

South Bay Transportation Projects

- Metro continues to address recovery from a large operating deficit due to sales tax and fare revenue shortfalls. Our ability to advance our projects will depend on how they decide to address their shortfall.
- South Bay agencies submitted five requests for additional MR and MM funds and two new projects.
 Staff will bring Metro Budget Request to Board in February.
- Measure R Transit Projects should be considered in July 2021 Metro Budget Request
- Green Line Extension to Torrance EIR Scoping Process is Underway.

 - Safe Parking Pilot Program still looking for a city to partner
 - Home Sharing Pilot Program Home Share South Bay



Homeless Services for the South Bay — Home Share South Bay

- Home Share South Bay is a pilot program to match homeowners with compatible housemates
- SBCCOG partnered with Silvernest, an online homesharing platform
- Focusing on finding interested homeowners to build base of homes
- To date 20 housemates and 4 homeowners have signed up from the following cities:
 - Carson, El Segundo, Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood, Lomita, Redondo Beach, and Torrance
- Working with cities, community-based organizations, and faith-based community to promote program
