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1 AGREEMENT NO.: 2 THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this day of 3 2018, by and between the CITY OF INGLEWOOD (hereinafter referred to as the "City"), a municipal corporation, located at One Manchester Boulevard, Inglewood, California 90301; 4 and the SOUTH BAY CITIES COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS (the "SBCCOG"), collectively referred 5 to herein as "Parties" and individually as a "Party." 6 7 RECITALS 8 WHEREAS, the City of Inglewood is a public entity organized and existing pursuant to 9 the laws of the State of California; and 10 WHEREAS, the SBCCOG is a joint powers authority organized and existing pursuant to 11 the laws of the state of California; and 12 WHEREAS, on February 23, 2018, the SBCCOG responded to a Caltrans' Sustainable 13 Communities grant Request For Proposals ("RFP") and submitted a proposal entitle, 14 "Feasibility Study & Implementation Strategy for a South Bay Slow-Speed Network 15 Demonstration," (the "Project"); and 16 WHEREAS, on June 25, 2018, Caltrans approved the SBCCOG Project in the amount of 17 \$435,267 which consists of the grant award of \$385,307, and a local match of \$49,960. The Award Letter set a deadline of October 19, 2018, for receipt of the City's resolution in favor of and supporting its role as Lead Agency for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City and SBCCOG desire to enter into an Agreement (the "Agreement") governing the terms and conditions for the City's administration of the Caltrans' Award on behalf of the SBCCOG's role as sub-recipient and primary consultant to complete the work and deliverables associated with the grant.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual terms and conditions contained herein, the City and the SBCCOG hereby agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 – INCORPORATION OF RECITALS

All of the recitals are incorporated herein by reference.

ARTICLE 2 – SBCCOG RESPONSIBILITIES

SBCCOG:

- 1. Agrees to complete the Project as described in the Scope of Work (the "SOW"). The SOW includes a description of the Project, including without limitation, Project tasks, and deliverables. In the event of ambiguity, conflict, or inconsistent language, the order of precedence shall be (in descending order):
 - a. Change orders and Amended Agreements (whichever occurs last);
 - b. This Agreement;
 - c. Exhibit "A;"
 - d. Exhibit "B;"
 - 2. Shall ensure that the tasks identified in the SOW are completed.
- 3. Agree to comply with, and be bound by all applicable federal, state, county, and local laws, rules, and regulations.
- 4. Agrees to complete the SOW in accordance with the budget and schedule identified in Exhibit "B," which is incorporated herein by this reference as if set forth in full.

- 5. Shall complete and submit all reports, as required by the Caltrans Award Agreement
- 6. Agrees to comply with all the terms of this Agreement, the SOW, the Caltrans Award Agreement, and all appropriate federal, state, and local laws, rules and regulations.
- 7. Shall submit procurement documentation (e.g. request for proposals, contracts, purchase orders), as appropriate, to the City showing that its normal procurement policy and competitive bid process was used in procuring any subcontract(s) or provide the City with proof of SBCCOG approval of a sole source procurement.
- 8. Obligations under this Agreement shall be only be deemed discharged upon Caltrans' acceptance of all deliverables contained in the SOW.
- 9. Shall provide the required Match Funds of \$49,960 consisting of local cash and in-kind funds.

ARTICLE 3 – CITY'S DUTIES

- 1. Subject to the terms and conditions contained herein, the City will volunteer its services and resources (at no cost), to be the Grant Manager for the Grant Agreement.
- 2. The City shall receive and submit all reports completed by the SBCCOG, as required by the Caltrans Award Agreement, to Caltrans.
- 3. The City, as necessary, shall review any procurement documents, or third-party contracts for the Project to ensure that the grant funding agency's competitive bid requirements have been met.
- 4. The City shall not be responsible for any match funds or In-kind funds or contributions.

ARTICLE 4 - PAYMENTS

- 1. When the City received Grant Program reimbursement funds, the City shall forward the reimbursement funds to the SBCCOG for an amount not to exceed \$385,307.
- 2. Pursuant to the Grants' reimbursement and reporting requirements, the City shall report to Caltrans the required total project local match not to exceed \$49,960; or, 11.47% of any (one) submitted invoice.

- 3. Payments to SBCCOG will be processed by the City within a reasonable time period, but in no event more than sixty (60) calendar days after the receipt of a reimbursement by Caltrans.
- 4. SBCCOG will be subject to, and will comply with, all requirements of the grant Agreement and other applicable requirements of Caltrans and the City as required by the City to fulfill its responsibilities as the grantee under the Grant Program.

ARTICLE 5 - INVOICE

- 1. SBOCCG will prepare and submit to the City a certified and original request for reimbursement for allowable project costs incurred and paid for by SBCCOG consistent with the SOW and the Grant Agreement. Invoices will include percentage of local cash match of (.05735%) along with In-Kind Match Fund contribution reports. Advance payments by the City are not allowed. The Request for Reimbursement submitted by SBCCOG shall be signed by an authorized agent who can duly certify the accuracy of the included information.
- 2. Not more frequently than once a month, but at least quarterly, SBCCOG will prepare and submit an invoice to the City for actual allowable Project costs incurred and paid for by SBCCOG consistent with the SOW and the grant Agreement. Each Request for Reimbursement will report the total of eligible expenditures consistent with the SOW and the Grant Agreement. The Request for Reimbursement will be accompanied by a status update in terms of the progress completed or not completed in relation to the SOW tasks and a detailed invoice describing all invoiced work completed.
 - 3. Eligible costs are described in the Grant Agreement.
 - 4. The Request for Reimbursement must be submitted on SBCCOG letterhead.
- 5. SBCCOG should consult with Caltrans for questions regarding non-reimbursable expenses.
- 6. SBCCOG shall provide written notification to the City and the Caltrans' Project manager regarding any changes to the SBCCOG's Project management team.
- 7. If any amounts paid to SBCCOG are disallowed or not reimbursed by Caltrans, for any reason, SBCCOG shall have the right, within 30 days from receipt of the City's

notice, to appeal and/or resubmit (pursuant to the Grant Agreement Guidelines) through the City, to Caltrans' for the disallowed or non-reimbursed amount(s).

- 8. SBCCOG shall comply with an ensure that work performed under this Agreement is done in compliance with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local laws, statues, ordinance, rules, regulations, and procedural requirements, including without limitation, Federal Acquisition Regulations ("FAR") and the applicable requirements and regulations of the City. SBCCOG acknowledges responsibility for obtaining copies of and complying with the terms of the most recent federal, state, and local laws and regulations and City requirements, including any amendments hereto.
- 9. The City shall make all disbursements electronically unless an exception is requested in writing. Disbursements via Automated Clearing House ("ACH") shall be made at no cost to SBCCOG. SBCCOG shall complete the ACH form and submit such to the City.
- 10. All requests for reimbursement shall be transmitted to the City Accounts Payable Department using one of the following two options:

ARTICLE 6 – TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence on December 1, 2018, and terminate on February 28, 2020.

ARTICLE 7 – INDEMNIFICATION

1. SBCCOG shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City and its directors, officers, and employees, from and against any and all claims, demands, liabilities, and reasonable attorneys' fees arising from SBCCOG's performance of this agreement but only in

proportion to and to the extent such claims, demands liabilities or attorneys' fees are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of SBCCOG, its officers, agents, or employees.

2. The shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless SBCCOG and its directors, officers, and employees, from and against any and all claims, demands, liabilities, and reasonable attorneys' fees arising from the City's performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such claims, demands, liabilities or attorneys' fees are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the City, its officer, agents, or employees.

Neither Party hereto shall be considered in default in the performance of its obligation hereunder to the extent that the performance of any such obligation is prevented or delayed by unforeseen causes including acts of God, acts of a public enemy, and government acts beyond the control and without fault of negligence of the affected Party. Each Party hereto shall give notice promptly to the other of the nature and extent of any such circumstances claimed to delay, hinder, or prevent performance of any obligation under this Agreement.

ARTICLE 8 – DEFAULT

Default under this Agreement is defined as one or more of the following: (i) SBCCOG fails to comply with the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement or the Grant Agreement; (ii) SBCCOG fails to perform satisfactorily or to make sufficient progress toward Project completion; (III) SBCCOG makes a material change to the SOW or Budget contained in the grant Agreement without prior written consent or approval by Caltrans and the City.

ARTICLE 9 – REMEDIES

- 1. In the event of a default by SBCCOG (as defined in Section 8), the City shall provide written notice of such default to the SBCCOG with a thirty (30) day period to cure the default. In the event SBCCOG fails to cure the default, or commit to cure the default and commence (the same within such thirty [30] day period), to the satisfaction of the City, the following remedies shall be available to the City:
 - a. The City may terminate this Agreement;

- The City may make a determination to make no further disbursements of Grant
 Program funds to SBCCOG;
- c. The City may recover from SBCCOG any Grant Program funds paid to the SBCCOG; and/or
- d. Any remedies Caltrans may have under the Grant Agreement.
- 2. Effective upon receipt of written notice of termination from the City, SBCCOG shall not undertake any new work or obligation with respect to this Agreement unless so approved by the City in writing.
- 3. Subject to the City's agreement providing prior written notice with a thirty (30) day period to cure the default, the remedies described herein are non-exclusive. The City shall have the right to enforce any and all rights and remedies herein or which may be now or hereafter available at law or in equity.

ARTICLE 10 – TERMINATION

- 1. If the City terminates this Agreement without cause prior to the end of the completion of the Project, SBCCOG shall take all reasonable measures to prevent further costs to the City under this Agreement. The City shall be responsible for any reasonable and non-cancelable obligations incurred by SBCCOG in the performance of this Agreement prior to the date of the notice to terminate, but only up to the undisbursed balance of funding authorized in this Agreement.
- 2. If SBCCOG fails to complete the Project in accordance with this Agreement or the Grant Agreement, or fails to fulfill any other obligations of this Agreement prior to the termination date, SBCCOG shall be liable for immediate repayment to the City of all amounts disbursed by the City under this Agreement, plus accrued interest and any further costs related to the Project. Caltrans may, at its sole discretion, examine the extent of SBCCOG compliance and not require repayment for work partially completed. This paragraph shall not be deemed to limit any other remedies available to the City for breach of this Agreement.
- 3. Upon termination, SBCCOG shall deliver all records and reports and other deliverables required by this Agreement or the Grant Agreement up to the time of

termination.

4. Either Party shall have the right to terminate this Grant Agreement at any time upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other. In the case of such "early" or "discretionary" termination by SBCCOG, defined as termination occurring before full performance of all objectives and activities and authorized funding herein, the City shall be entitled to seek full reimbursement for all costs and payments made on this Agreement.

ARTICLE 11 – AUDIT PROVISIONS

- 1. The City, in order to fulfill its responsibility, shall have the right to conduct audits of the Project at its own expense, as needed, such as financial and compliance audits and performance audits. SBCCOG shall establish and maintain proper accounting procedures and cash management records and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP") as applied to governmental agencies. SBCCOG shall reimburse the City for any expenditure not in compliance with the SOW or other terms and conditions of this Agreement, or other applicable requirements of the City. The City shall use the Federal Acquisition Regulations ("FAR") standards in determining the reasonableness of costs incurred. The City shall have the right to conduct a final audit using an outside auditing firm. The findings of that City audit will be final
- 2. SBCCOG shall retain all original records and documents related to the Project for a period of three (3) years after final payment.

ARTICLE 12 – DISPUTES

Unless otherwise directed by the City, SBCCOG shall continue performance under this Agreement while matters in dispute are being resolved.

ARTICLE 13 - COPYRIGHTS

SBCCOG reserves the right to protect by copyright original works developed under this Agreement.

ARTICLE 14 – OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. This Agreement, including any documents herein attached and incorporated into this agreement, the Caltrans Award Agreement, the RFP and the Proposal constitute the

entire understanding between the City and SBCCOG, with respect to the subject matter herein. The Agreement shall not be amended, nor any provision or breach hereof waived, except in

- SBCCOG shall expend Grant Program funds in the manner described in the SOW and the Caltrans Award Agreement. Should the total dollars of a line-item included in the budge contained within the Caltrans Award agreement need or be required to change (increased or decreased) the SBCCOG shall notify Caltrans and the City in writing for permission(s) to do so. Any subsequent revisions to the SOW, budget, or schedule will be revised by the SBCCOG and submitted to Caltrans and the City for approval. Any adjustments may not exceed the limits for the total Project Awards and Match Funds associated with the

In the event of litigation in the United States District Court, venue shall lie exclusively in the Central District of California, in Los Angeles.

ARTICLE 23 – MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. The Parties waive any benefits from the principle of *contra proferentum* and interpreting ambiguities against drafters. No party shall be deemed to be the drafter of this Agreement, or of any particular provision or provisions, and no part of this Agreement shall be construed against any party on the basis that the particular party is the drafter of any part of this Agreement.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, and when each party hereto has signed and delivered at least one such counterpart, each counterpart shall be deemed an original and, when taken together with the other signed counterparts, shall constitute one Agreement, which shall be binding upon and effective as to all parties hereto.

EIGHTH AMENDMENT

THIS EIGHTH AMENDMENT ("EIGHTH AMENDMENT") TO THE AGREEMENT TO JOINTLY DELIVER THE 2010-2012 SOUTH BAY ENERGY EFFICIENCY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM dated January 1, 2010 (as amended, the "Agreement") is effective as of January 1, 2019 (the "Eighth Amendment Effective Date") by and among SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY ("SCE"), SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA GAS COMPANY ("SCG") AND SOUTH BAY CITIES COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS ("SBCCOG"). Terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meaning ascribed to them in the Agreement. SCE and SCG may be referred to individually herein as the "Utilities". The Utilities and SBCCOG may be referred to herein individually as a "Party" or collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties previously executed the Agreement effective January 1, 2010 and subsequently amended the Agreement seven times to extend its term in accordance with the applicable decisions of the California Public Utilities Commission ("Commission");

WHEREAS, on October 28, 2015, the Commission issued its Decision for Energy Efficiency Goals for 2016 and Beyond and Energy Efficiency Rolling Portfolio Mechanics ("D.15-10-028") which authorized the Energy Efficiency Program rolling portfolio mechanics for 2016 and beyond, and continuation of energy efficiency programs, consistent with the terms and conditions set forth in the Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Eighth Amendment;

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to further amend the Agreement as necessary to set forth the 2019 program budget and to extend the agreement through the program cycle beginning January 1, 2019 and ending December 31, 2019.

NOW THEREFORE, for valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. To the extent applicable, any reference in the Agreement, as amended, to the "2010-2012" Program, shall also hereby include the 2019 Program.
- 2. Section 1.16 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following, and all references to "PIP" or "Program Implementation Plan" in the Agreement shall be changed to "IP" or "Implementation Plan".
 - 1.16: IP or Implementation Plan: The Implementation Plan, as may be amended from time to time, specific to this Partnership, together with the SCE Energy Leader Partnership Master IP and SCG Local Government Master IP, which include the anticipated scope of the Program in Utilities' service territory, as approved by the Commission. The Implementation Plan is incorporated into this Agreement by reference hereto and will be provided to Program Participant upon written request.
- 3. Section 10.1.4 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
 - 10.1.4. SBCCOG Budget Adjustment and Fully Burdened Labor Rate Change

The Parties acknowledge that this Program is offered in furtherance of the Commission's strategic energy efficiency goals for California and is based on SBCCOG's

agreement to help achieve such goals for the Partnership. The Partner Budget for SBCCOG is set forth in Exhibits B-1 (SCE) and B-3 (SCG), which exhibits may be modified in the sole discretion of the Utilities, without formal amendment to the Agreement (notwithstanding Section 24 hereof), consistent with Section 10.1.1 and 10.1.4 hereof. SCG as the Lead Utility, will provide at least 30 days' notice to SBCCOG of the final Partner Budget and any modifications thereto, and any such notice will include a copy of the modified Partner Budget and the effective date of any such modified Partner Budget. Pursuant to this Section, any such amended Exhibit B-1 and B-3 shall automatically be incorporated into this Agreement and take effect on the effective date stated in the notice from Utilities to SBCCOG.

SBCCOG, in its discretion, may request changes to the Joint Fully Burdened Labor Rate Table to modify the maximum fully burdened labor rate for each title, subject to, the lead Utility, SCG's approval. If SCG approves the amended Joint Fully Burdened Labor Rate Table (Exhibit B-2), it will issue a new Joint Fully Burdened Labor Rate Table to be incorporated into the Agreement without requiring a formal amendment executed by both Parties, notwithstanding Section 24 hereof.

4. Section 11 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

11. END DATE FOR PROGRAM AND ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES

Unless this Agreement is terminated pursuant to Section 25, or unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or so ordered by the Commission, the Parties shall complete all Program Administrative activities (as defined in the IP) and all reporting requirements by no later than March 31, 2020, and all Direct Implementation and Marketing & Outreach activities by no later than December 31, 2019.

5. Section 12 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

12. FINAL INVOICES

SBCCOG must submit final invoices to the Utilities no later than March 31, 2020.

6. Section 25.1 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following: Section 25.1 Term

This agreement shall be effective as of the Effective Date. Subject to Section 37, the Agreement shall continue in effect until March 31, 2020 unless otherwise terminated in accordance with this agreement as amended.

7. Exhibit B-1 (ENERGY EFFICIENCY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM 2017-2018 GOALS & PARTNER BUDGET FOR SBCCOG), Exhibit B-2 (Joint Fully Burdened Labor Rate Table), as such have otherwise been amended from time to time, are hereby deleted in their entirety and replaced with the versions of Exhibit B-1 (SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISION COMPANY 2019 GOALS & SBCCOG BUDGET FOR SBCCOG) and Exhibit B-2 JOINT FULLY BURDENED LABOR RATE TABLE attached to this Eighth Amendment, which attached versions are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of the Agreement. A new Exhibit B-3 (SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA GAS COMPANY 2019 GOALS & SBCCOG BUDGET for SBCCOG), as attached to this Eighth Amendment, is incorporated herein by reference and made a part of the Agreement. The Parties acknowledge and agree that if a Commission decision or order alters the amount approved for the 2019 Program budget(s), as set forth in Exhibits B-1 and

- B-3, SCE and SCG shall amend Exhibit B-1 and B-3 to reflect the approved 2019 Program Budget in any such Commission decision or order, in accordance with Section 30 of this Agreement.
- 8. This Eighth Amendment may be executed in one or more counterparts and delivered by electronic means, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which together shall be deemed to be one and the same instrument.
- 9. General. From and after the Eighth Amendment Effective Date, any reference to the Agreement contained in any notice, request, certificate or other instrument, document or agreement shall be deemed to mean the Agreement, as amended by any prior amendments to the Agreement, and this Eighth Amendment. In the event of any conflict between the Agreement, as amended, and this Eighth Amendment, this Eight Amendment shall prevail. All remaining provisions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect. Each party is fully responsible for ensuring that the person signing this Eighth Amendment on that party's behalf has the requisite legal authority to do so.

Siembab Corporation has a Task Order with the SBCCOG to provide professional services to support the Regional Broadband Initiative for \$20,000. It currently expires December 31, 2018. Staff is requesting a no cost extension to June 30, 2019.

RECOMMENDATION

Extend work for Siembab Corporation on the Regional Broadband Initiative to June 30, 2019 at no additional cost.

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MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SOUTH BAY CITIES COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS AND THE CITY OF GARDENA

FOR COST SHARING FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE COORDINATED INTEGRATED MONITORING PROGRAM (CIMP) FOR THE DOMINGUEZ CHANNEL WATERSHED MANAGEMENT AREA

This Agreement is made and entered into as of November 28, 2018, by and between the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG), a California Joint Powers Authority, and the City of Gardena, a municipal corporation ("Permit Holder").

RECITALS

- 1. For the purposes of this Agreement, the term "PERMITTEES" shall mean the Cities of Los Angeles, Carson, El Segundo, Hawthorne, Inglewood, Lawndale, Lomita, and the Los Angeles County Flood Control District (LACFCD) and the County of Los Angeles (County).
- The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Los Angeles Region (Regional Board) have classified the Greater Los Angeles County Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System Permit (MS4) as a large MS4 pursuant to 40 CFR section 122.26(b)(4) and a major facility pursuant to 40 CFR section 122.2.
- 3. The Regional Board adopted National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System MS4 Permit Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System Permit Order No. R4-2012-0175 (MS4 Permit).
- 4. The MS4 Permit became effective on December 28, 2012, and requires that the LACFCD, the COUNTY, and 84 of the 88 cities (excluding Avalon, Long Beach, Palmdale, and Lancaster) within the County comply with the prescribed elements of the MS4 Permit.
- 5. The MS4 Permit identified the PERMITTEES as MS4 PERMITTEES that are responsible for compliance with the MS4 Permit requirements pertaining to the PERMITTEES collective jurisdictional area in the Dominguez Channel Watershed Management Area.
- 6. The PERMITTEES elected voluntarily to collaborate on the development of a Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program (CIMP) in accordance with the MS4 Permit for a portion of the Dominguez Channel Watershed Management Area as identified in Exhibit A of this Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to comply with all applicable monitoring requirements of the MS4 Permit.
- 7. The United States Environmental Protection Agency established the Total Maximum Daily Loads ("TMDL") for Toxic Pollutants on March 23, 2012, with the intent of protecting and improving water quality in the Dominguez

- Channel and the Greater Los Angeles and Long Beach Harbor Waters ("Harbor Toxic Pollutants TMDL").
- 8. The Harbor Toxic Pollutants TMDL regulates certain discharges from National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("NPDES") permit holders, requiring organization and cooperation among the PERMITTEES.
- 9. The PERMITTEES manage, drain or convey storm water into at least a portion of the Dominguez Channel, Greater Los Angeles and Long Beach Harbor Waters (including Consolidated Slip).
- 10. The PERMITTEES desire to facilitate the achievement of the objectives of the Harbor Toxic Pollutants TMDL by preparation and implementation of the CIMP
- 11. The PERMITTEES prepared the CIMP, and the SBCCOG has also retained the City of Los Angeles (CITY) to conduct the monitoring and reporting required by the CIMP.
- 12. For purposes of this Agreement the term "Consultant" shall refer to the CITY.
- 13. On December 11, 2015 Regional Board approved the CIMP.
- 14. The mission of the SBCCOG is to allow its members to act collaboratively and focus on improving the environment. As part of its mission and to help its members implement the CIMP for the Dominguez Channel Watershed Management Area, the SBCCOG entered into a MOA with the PERMITTEES to administer the monitoring contract with the CITY and invoice the PERMITEES for the monitoring services.
- 15. The City of Gardena is an Individual MS4 permit holder who is not a PERMITTEE but has indicated a desire to participate in the CIMP implementation for individual permit compliance.
- 16. The PERMITTEES authorized the SBCCOG to enter into individual separate MOAs with such individual MS4 permit holders (PERMIT HOLDER; who shall not have voting rights in any group relating to the PERMITTEES) for CIMP Implementation cost sharing purposes only.
- 17. The Permit Holder desires to obtain monitoring data collected as part of the CIMP Implementation.
- 18. The role of the SBCCOG is to invoice and collect funds from the Permit Holder to cover its portion of the costs for CIMP Implementation.
- 19. The Permit Holder and the SBCCOG are collectively referred to as the "PARTIES."

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth

herein, the PARTIES do hereby agree as follows:

- Section 1. Recitals. The recitals set forth above are fully incorporated as part of this Agreement.
- Section 2. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this MOA is for the Permit Holder to cost share in the CIMP Implementation.
- Section 3. <u>Cooperation</u>. The PARTIES shall fully cooperate with one another to achieve the purposes of this MOA.
- Section 4. Voluntary Nature. The PARTIES voluntarily enter into this MOA.
- Section 5. <u>Binding Effect</u>. This MOA shall become binding on SBCCOG and the Permit Holder.
- Section 6. <u>Term.</u> This MOA shall commence on September 1, 2018 and shall expire on February 28, 2019 unless terminated earlier pursuant to the provisions of Section 11 herein. The term of this Agreement may be extended by mutual agreement of the parties as may be necessary or desirable to carry out its purposes.

Section 7. Role of the SBCCOG.

- (a) The SBCCOG shall invoice and collect funds from the Permit Holder to cover a portion of the costs of hiring and paying the CITY to implement the CIMP.
- (b) The SBCCOG shall administer the CITY'S contract for implementation of the CIMP by contracting with and paying the CITY.

Section 8. Financial Terms.

- (a) The Permit Holder shall pay forty-four thousand (\$44,000) dollars to the SBCCOG in exchange for specific monitoring data from the CIMP Implementation as follows:
- i. Sediment chemistry, sediment toxicity, and benthic infauna data from the 2018 Regional Bight Program (station B18-10397 only)
- ii. Fish tissue bioaccumulation data from the Dominguez Channel Estuary (2018 only)
- (b) The SBCCOG will retain a fee of 10% (\$4,000) for their services. The remaining amount (\$40,000) will be credited towards the PERMITTEES cost of implementing the CIMP.
 - (c) The Permit Holder's payment is due upon execution of this MOA.
- (d) Upon receiving an invoice from the SBCCOG, the Permit Holder shall pay its invoice to the SBCCOG within thirty (30) days of the invoice's date.

- (e) The Permit Holder will be delinquent if its invoiced payment is not received by the SBCCOG within forty-five (45) days after the invoice's date. The SBCCOG will follow the procedure listed below: 1) verbally contact the representative of the Permit Holder; and 2) submit a formal letter from the SBCCOG Executive Officer to the Permit Holder at the address listed in Section 12 of the MOA. If payment is not received within sixty (60) days of the invoice date, the SBCCOG may terminate this MOA. However, no such termination may be ordered unless the SBCCOG first provides the Permit Holder with thirty (30) days written notice of its intent to terminate the MOA. The terminated Permit Holder shall remain obligated to SBCCOG for its delinquent payment and any other obligations incurred prior to the date of termination If the SBCCOG terminates this MOA due to the Permit Holder being delinquent in its payment, Permit Holder shall no longer be entitled to the monitoring data collected as part of the CIMP.
- (f) Any delinquent payment by the Permit Holder shall accrue compound interest at the average rate of interest paid by the Local Agency Investment Fund during the time that the payment is delinquent, provided that the interest shall not exceed any limit imposed by law.

Section 9. Independent Contractor.

- (a) The SBCCOG is, and shall at all times remain, a wholly independent contractor for performance of the obligations described in this MOA. The SBCCOG's officers, officials, employees and agents shall at all times during the term of this MOA be under the exclusive control of the SBCCOG. The Permit Holder cannot control the conduct of the SBCCOG or any of its officers, officials, employees or agents. The SBCCOG and its officers, officials, employees, and agents shall not be deemed to be employees of the Permit Holder.
- (b) The SBCCOG is solely responsible for the payment of salaries, wages, other compensation, employment taxes, workers' compensation, or similar taxes for its employees and Consultants performing services hereunder.

Section 10. <u>Indemnification and Insurance</u>.

- (a) The Permit Holder shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the SBCCOG and the PERMITTEES and their officers, employees, and other representatives and agents from and against any and all liabilities, actions, suits proceedings, claims, demands, losses, costs, and expenses, including legal costs and attorney's fees, for injury to or death of person(s), for damage to property (including property owned by the SBCCOG and any Permittee) for negligent or intentional acts, errors and omissions committed by the Permit Holder or its officers, employees, and agents, arising out of or related to that Permit Holder's performance under this MOA, except for such loss as may be caused by SBCCOG's negligence or that of its officers, employees, or other representatives and agents other than the Consultant.
- (b) SBCCOG makes no guarantee or warranty that the reports prepared by SBCCOG, PERMITEES or its Consultant shall be approved by the relevant governmental authorities. SBCCOG shall have no liability to the Permit Holder for the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Consultant. The Permit Holder's sole recourse for any negligent or intentional act or omission of the Consultant shall be against the Consultant and its insurance.

Section 11. <u>Termination</u>.

(a) Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause upon not less than thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party. The effective date of termination shall be upon the date specified on the notice of termination, or, in the event no date is specified, upon the thirtieth (30th) day following delivery of the notice.

Section 12. Miscellaneous.

- (a) Permit Holder has been accepted as a participant in the CIMP Implementation and shall not be entitled to appoint a representative or to vote or participate in any way in decisions assigned to PERMITTEES. Participant status entitles Permit Holder only to the monitoring data as specified in Sections 8ai-ii collected as part of the CIMP Implementation.
- (b) <u>Notices</u>. All Notices which the PARTIES require or desire to give hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed given when delivered personally or three (3) days after mailing by registered or certified mail (return receipt requested) to the following address or as such other addresses as the PARTIES may from time to time designate by written notice in the aforesaid manner:

- (c) <u>Amendment</u>. The terms and provisions of this MOA may not be amended, modified or waived, except by a written instrument signed by all PARTIES and approved by all PARTIES as substantially similar to this MOA.
- (d) <u>Waiver</u>. Waiver by either the SBCCOG or the Permit Holder of any term, condition, or covenant of this MOA shall not constitute a waiver of any other term, condition, or covenant. Waiver, by the SBCCOG or the Permit Holder, to any breach of the provisions of this MOA shall not constitute a waiver of any other provision or a waiver of any subsequent breach of any provision of this MOA.
- (e) <u>Law to Govern: Venue</u>. This MOA shall be interpreted, construed, and governed according to the laws of the State of California. In the event of litigation between the PARTIES, venue shall lie exclusively in the County of Los Angeles.
 - (f) No Presumption in Drafting. The PARTIES to this MOA agree that the

general rule than an MOA is to be interpreted against the PARTIES drafting it, or causing it to be prepared, shall not apply.

- (g) <u>Severability</u>. If any term, provision, condition or covenant of this MOA is declared or determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this MOA shall not be affected thereby and this MOA shall be read and construed without the invalid, void, or unenforceable provisions(s).
- (h) <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This MOA constitutes the entire agreement of the PARTIES with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous agreements, whether written or oral, with respect thereto.
- (i) <u>Counterparts</u>. This MOA may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which taken together shall constitute but one and the same instrument, provided, however, that such counterparts shall have been delivered to all PARTIES to this MOA.
- (j) <u>Legal Representation</u>. All PARTIES have been represented by counsel in the preparation and negotiation of this MOA. Accordingly, this MOA shall be construed according to its fair language.
- (k) <u>Authority to Execute this Agreement</u>. The person or persons executing this MOA on behalf of Permit Holder warrants and represents that he or she has the authority to execute this MOA on behalf of the Permit Holder and has the authority to bind Permit Holder.

Adherence to Strategic Plan:

Goal A: Environment, Transportation, and Economic Development. Facilitate, implement, and/or educate members and others about environmental, transportation, and economic development programs that benefit the South Bay.

I. PROGRAMS - TECHNOLOGY, PLANNING, & RESEARCH

Climate Action/Adaptation

The Adaptation Planning Kickoff Meeting has been scheduled for December 13th. The agenda will include an overview of adaptation work and how it fits into city planning documents to comply with SB 379, as well as project timeline and next steps. The Climate Fellow has researched and recorded climate projections and exposures for the sub-region as an initial step in generating a Vulnerability Assessment for the South Bay. SBCCOG staff has developed and submitted a project proposal for the Caltrans Adaptation Planning Grant that will complement the Adaptation work currently underway. Several cities, including El Segundo, Gardena, Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Palos Verdes Estates, Redondo Beach, and Torrance provided letters of support for this proposal.

Energy Efficiency

On November 29, city staff were recognized at our biennial Energy Efficiency and Energy Leader recognition luncheon. All but one city was in attendance. The program included SCE and SoCalGas executives and the SBCCOG Chair congratulated our cities for the great job they are doing to reduce electricity and gas usage through energy efficiency projects. In addition, Juliette Finzi Hart, PhD, U.S. Geological Survey, Pacific Coastal & Marine Science Center was the keynote speaker. Thank you to the City of Torrance who hosted the event at the George Nakano Theatre.

SBCCOG staff has been working with other partnerships, utility partners, and other agencies to try and secure future funding for incentive/rebates for local governments. SBCCOG staff has met with the CPUC Local Government Liaison and his new colleague, who both will try to assist with preserving local government energy efficiency measures. The next steps are to submit to SCE & SCG an intent to participate with 3rd Parties for program funding in 2020 and create a Factsheet on Local Government energy efficiency issues.

SBCCOG staff, the energy engineer, and city staff developed a Request for Quotes (RFQ) for a bulk purchase of outdoor lighting. Several cities are trying to quickly install outdoor lighting before February 28, 2019 in

order to take advantage of an Edison incentive before the new time of use rates start March 19, 2019. The intent of the RFQ is to save cities staff time and help expedite the process while getting volume pricing discounts. Cities that are evaluating moving forward with the purchase include Carson, El Segundo, Gardena, Hawthorne, Inglewood, Manhattan Beach, Redondo Beach, and Torrance; however, any South Bay city can take advantage of this bulk purchase opportunity. The window for submitting bids closed on November 27, 2018 and 9 proposals were received. SBCCOG staff is reviewing the proposals, and bidders will be notified by December 4 if they met the criteria. Next SBCCOG staff will provide their findings to the cities for their consideration.

The South Bay continues to have a robust "pipeline" of projects specific to electricity (listed below). Note: if projects are in progress and are scheduled to be completed in 2019, Edison is committed to complete their funding obligations as long as the city also meets all of their project requirements. (Also, listed in the chart is each city's Energy Leader Partnership (ELP) program status.)

CA Green Business Network (CAGBN) & South Bay Green Business Assist Program (GBAP):

CAGBN - The SBCCOG team continues to conduct outreach and work with businesses to achieve certification for programs in Torrance and Hawthorne. During the month of November, SBCCOG staff was able to certify three businesses that had previously been at the participant (Tier 1) level - two businesses in Torrance and one business in Hawthorne.

As businesses are certified in the CAGBN, they also become GBAP participants. Water Bottle Filling Station Program

Status: West Basin has continued the funding of this program. Public sites are eligible to install two (2) water bottle filling stations for the same Tax ID # (changed from only one allowed in previous funding cycle). SBCCOG staff reached out to the City of Lawndale, and there are plans to apply in the coming months. Allocation

As the Los Angeles Board of Supervisors has yet to approve the final Measure A Report, I wanted to provide the South Bay City Council of Government Membership an update on the next steps for the Measure A Final Report. I have been alerted that the Final Measure A Report will be presented to the Board of Supervisors for consideration and action at their Board Meeting at 9:30 AM on Tuesday, January 8, 2019. This final report is currently available on the Los Angeles County Regional Park and Recreational District Web Site at RPOSD@lacounty.gov as well as the Board of Supervisor's website under Correspondence.

As you are aware last March 2018 I brought before the SBCCOG Board a concern that the Measure A Implementation Committee consisted of a large percentage of Non-Profit Organizations or CBO's and a much smaller representation of municipal agencies. This concern highlighted that the Implementation Committee is recommending a carve-out or targeting of funds within the Competitive Grant Funds in the amount of approximately 30% so that only 70% of the remaining funds would be distributed between all agencies who did not qualify as having High or Very High Need Study Areas. This action is not following the initial intent of Measure A that was overwhelmingly approved by the voters in Los Angeles County in 2016, as the intent was that 100% of the funds within the Competitive Grant Areas would be provided to the most deserving individual projects within Los Angeles County. Unfortunately, this Measure A Final Report is following the same concept and has included as a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors an approximate 30% carve-out or targeting of funds that I have highlighted in my summary notes below.

Given that the Board of Supervisors plan to review this Measure A Final Report on January 8, 2019, I am again providing a draft letter for your consideration that can be sent to the appropriate Los Angeles County Board of Supervisor District Representative by December 20, 2018. (See Attached) It is my understanding that the Board of Supervisors can bring a motion forward to make changes to any of the recommendations within the Measure A Final Report, and I am certain that there will be a many Non-Profit Organizations or CBO's attending the January 8, 2019 Board of Supervisor Meeting to speak on their own behalf.

With regard to the pending litigation, I have been informed that the litigation is moving forward, as there was a hearing at the Appellate Court the week of November 12th, which will be followed by a decision (1-2 months) then the final decision called a remitter (1-3 months). If the decision is not in favor of RPOSD/County I was informed that they will pursue a request for review from the State Supreme Court (estimated to take an additional 4-12 months).

Lastly, for ease of review of the Measure A Final Report, I am providing you the draft summary of Administrative and Grant Requesting policies for Measure A that are being recommended for adoption by the Board of Supervisors below:

Administrative Policies

Consumer Price Index Updates

- The Measure A special tax rate shall be automatically adjusted every two years to the maximum rate allowed by the Consumer Price Index Update formula.
- The Board may, in any given year, choose to adjust the tax rate to a rate less than the maximum.

Bonding

- Measure A authorizes RPOSD, at its discretion, to issue bonds secured by the special tax revenues to finance grants.
- RPOSD shall work with the responsible County Departments to determine the appropriate conditions and timing for bond issuance.

Countywide Neighborhood Parks Needs Assessment Maintenance

- The neighborhood park inventory data shall be updated by all park agencies annually. Verifying and updating data is required to remain in Good Standing.
- The Neighborhood Park Need by Study Area Map shall be published periodically with updated neighborhood park inventory and U.S. Census population data.
- The Countywide Neighborhood Park and Recreation Needs Assessment (NPNA) shall be updated every 8 to 10 years and shall contain at a minimum the metrics used in the 2016 Countywide Parks Needs Assessment and updates of the study areas' neighborhood park need levels.
- The Regional Recreation, Beaches, Rural Areas, and Open Space Assessment shall be conducted to inventory existing public recreational lands and amenities from the regional perspective and determine the needs of the many diverse geographical areas of the County. The results of the assessment will inform the project planning and selection for competitive grants. The assessment will be conducted soon and updated every 8 to 10 years.

Board of Supervisors Designated Park Projects

• The Board shall allocate two (2) percent of Measure A annual revenue for County priority projects, with each Supervisorial District receiving one-fifth of the annual amount.

- The funds may be committed to grants for eligible projects annually or may accumulate.
- Supervisorial Districts may choose to combine their available funds to jointly award grants for eligible projects.

Sharing Funds

A public agency receiving annual allocations under the Community-based Park Investment Program and Neighborhood Parks, Healthy Communities, & Urban Greening Program may consider sharing funds across Study Areas of its own or of adjacent jurisdictions provided that:

- The funds will be expended on a specific project or projects that are eligible for Measure A funds.
- The agency initiating the request demonstrates to RPOSD's satisfaction that all Study Area(s) involved will benefit from the sharing of funds and resulting project(s).
- RPOSD determines that the proposed sharing of funds will result in timely completion of the park project(s); and
- The governing body of each public agency has authorized the sharing of funds for a specific project or projects.

Nonprofit Maintenance and Servicing Allocations

- Eligible nonprofit organizations that own and/or operate parklands may apply for M&S funds annually, following the established procedures and requirements for M&S funds, including any subsequent updates.
- A city, the county, or a joint powers agency may assign a portion or all of its unexpended M&S funds to a nonprofit or other public operating agency to maintain a project funded by RPOSD. The duration of this assignment must also be defined.

Good Standing

- Good Standing will be required of all grantees to have payment requests processed and receive any grant funds from RPOSD.
- Good Standing is achieved and maintained when a grantee maintains compliance with all requirements stated in the guidelines, policies, and procedures of RPOSD for both Proposition A and Measure A.

Each competitive grant program will make funding available for project types that could occur in and/or serve High and Very High Need Study Areas.

Evaluation Criteria

Each competitive grant program will include a "Level of Need" evaluation criterion. This criterion will consider whether a project or program

- serves or benefits residents of High or Very High Need Study Areas;
- offers the greatest regional benefits or serve the greatest regional need, such as in rural areas of the County; or

• provides services to and/or recruits most of its participants from High or Very High Need Study Areas.

Long-Range Planning

Measure A-funded projects will be consistent with each Study Area's long-range park planning documents, such as a parks master plan, community plan, or other adopted planning document (such as the Countywide Neighborhood Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment).

Community Engagement

RPOSD will require appropriate, thorough, and timely community outreach and engagement for all projects funded by Measure A to ensure inclusion, input, and support from the public.

Monitoring and Correction

RPOSD will consistently monitor, track, and if necessary, adjust the administration of both competitive funding and annual allocations to ensure that the goals of Measure A are being met.

Technical Assistance

RPOSD will provide technical assistance to potential applicants and grantees throughout the stages of the grant process to ensure that barriers to applying for, receiving, and administering funding are reduced, and that the goals of Measure A are being met.

Targeting Funds

The portion of funds to be targeted from the Competitive Grant Funds is initially set at 30 percent that will be designated for projects in High or Very High Need Study Areas. This percentage will be evaluated periodically and may increase or decrease in future years based on the evaluation of metrics tracked by RPOSD, such as for funds and competitive grant proposals. This would affect the following programs:

- Natural Lands, Local Beaches, Water Conservation and Protection Competitive Grants;
- Regional Recreation, Multi-use Trails and Accessibility Competitive Grants; and
- Acquisition-Only Grants

BACKGROUND

At the January Board of Directors meeting, Torrance Community Services Director John Jones requested that the SBCCOG send a letter and ask our cities to send a letter to our county supervisors about the criteria being considered for allocation of Park Bond Measure A competitive funds. The Board agreed and the attached letter was sent as well as sending a request to cities to do the same.

Subsequent to the SBCCOG taking this position, I received a phone call from the Social Justice Learning Institute Executive Director D'Artagnan Scorza. This is an organization in the City of Inglewood that we have worked with on some of our projects. Dr. Scorza stated that he is expressing the concern of other community organizations who were not happy with the SBCCOG's letter. He agreed to send me further information which is what follows:

Thank you for your interest in additional background information on Measure A. Please let me know if the below provides you with what you need, or if there is anything else that would be useful.

- From 2015-2016, LA County undertook a countywide comprehensive Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment, which divided the county into 188 study areas and used specific metrics to assess each area's park need. Each area's park need is characterized as Very High, High, Moderate, Low, or Very Low, resulting in the map on PDF p.7.
- Measure A is a voter-approved countywide parks and open space funding measure developed and passed after the Parks Needs Assessment. Revenue is based on a parcel tax of 1.5 cents per square foot of development, which amounts to approximately \$96 million per year.
- The Measure A expenditure plan divides funds into seven spending categories.
 - o 50% of all revenue will be directly allocated back to each study area, based on population.
 - o 13% of all revenue will be directly allocated to High and Very High Need study areas.
 - o 14% of all revenue will be general competitive grants. Within this pot, 30% of general competitive grant funding will be set-aside for the High and Very High Needs areas, per a recommendation by the Measure A Implementation Steering Committee. This set-aside amounts to only 4% of all Measure A revenue.
- The current Measure A competitive grant program draft scoring criteria proposes extra points for proposals in High/Very High Need areas and the weighting of level of need in scoring. The steering committee (the 45 member governance structure to guide Measure A implementation guidelines) is leaning in this direction to encourage proposals from high and very high need

study areas (not to exclude excellent projects from other parts of the County) but in keeping with one of the fundamental principles of the Measure overall which is to make some countywide progress eliminating stark disparities in park access by reducing the intensity and frequency of "very high need" study areas in the County.

Key points:

- 10 SBCCOG member cities and unincorporated areas are considered in Very High or High park need and would benefit from the emphasis on need. Very High Need: Inglewood, Hawthorne, Lawndale, Unincorporated Lennox, Unincorporated West Athens-Westmont and High Need: Gardena, Carson, North Torrance, Unincorporated Alondra Park, Unincorporated West Carson
- Half of all Measure A funding goes right back to the cities based on a population calculation.
- Even though the set-aside for High/Very High needs areas is 30% of general competitive grants, that amounts to just 4% of all Measure A funding (\$4.1 million). In total, only 17% of Measure A (\$16.4 million) is targeted to High/Very High needs areas.
- The competitive grant scoring criteria are still in draft form, and there is strong interest among many Measure A Implementation Steering Committee members in ensuring that scoring criteria address needs based on the Parks Needs Assessment.
- Additionally, scoring criteria to demonstrate a project's multiple benefits, including health, environment, and public safety/gang reduction (per the ballot language) are being considered, so strong proposals, regardless of location, can score well.
- Measure A is designed to leverage other state and local funding sources; we all want a program that positions the whole region to do well.
- Inequality hurts growth, according to multiple economic analyses, which make the case that equity should be at the heart of local planning because the entire region will profit. Equity is not a special interest; it is a common one. (Source: <u>USC "Measures Matter," 2018</u>)

RE: Noise and safety concerns (emanating from Hawthorne Municipal Airport, LAX, Long Beach Airport and Torrance Airport) adversely affecting the South Bay Cities as a result of recently adopted (FAA) Federal Aviation Agency - NextGen SoCal Metroplex flight paths.

Dear Congressman Lieu:

On October 16 and November 6, 2018, the City of Redondo Beach received and filed reports on noise issues as a result of increasing air traffic which heavily impacts our neighborhoods and residents. On behalf of myself, the Redondo Beach City Council and our residents, I strongly urge the FAA to re-evaluate and modify the NextGen Flight path guidelines that have been implemented over the highly populated South Bay Cities since the adoption of the SoCal Metroplex system.

We understand that the FAA began implementing the SoCal Metroplex in a phased approach starting in November 2016; that the project encompasses a broad region including local airports; and that it replaces conventional air traffic control systems with new satellite-based procedures with the intended purpose of improving the safety, efficiency, and reliability of the National Airspace System.

The FAA states that it "complied with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act and prepared an environmental assessment (EA) of the Southern California Metroplex project area" and the FAA asserts that "The EA found that the proposed project would cause no significant impacts to people, historic properties, parks or other applicable environmental resources; and, implementing the project will not significantly affect noise, energy, climate and air quality emissions in the study area."

Although a public comment period for the Draft EA was open for 120 days and the FAA conducted 11 public workshops, <u>none</u> took place in Redondo Beach. The lack of outreach to Redondo Beach or community engagement with our residents by the FAA has created adverse impacts on the quality of life in our vibrant community.

Some of the City's main concerns with the expanded use and flight plan changes emanating from Hawthorne Municipal Airport, LAX, Long Beach Airport, and Torrance Airport are as follows:

1. Increased noise resulting from a greater number of flights in compressed areas flying lower over homes, schools and parks.

We have been contacted by local residents from Redondo Beach and neighboring cities concerned about the significant increase in flights over densely populated areas that were not pre-existing flight paths prior to these changes. Noise abatement guidelines are not being followed or enforced due to "Voluntary" status or aircraft operators are choosing to ignore them. The flight paths and low altitudes are extremely disruptive to the health and wellness of our residents.

 Increased environmental impacts from jet pollution and particulate matter create long-term health issues such as asthma, respiratory & cardiac disease, and sleep disruption.

The Hawthorne Municipal Airport currently operates 24 hours a day. The expansion of their private charter Jet Center coupled with the potential additional traffic as a result of Santa Monica airport's closure and the new Inglewood Stadium will create a dramatic increase in operations. Furthermore, the redirected LAX, Long Beach or Torrance Airport operations are causing an unprecedented increase in low altitude flight paths over the South Bay. Use of the Hawthorne Airport facility or any neighboring airport should not come at the cost of the peaceful enjoyment of neighboring cities' residents.

The City of Redondo Beach hopes that the Hawthorne City Council will consider its influence on and strive to enforce Fly Quietly guidelines as well as work with the FAA towards improving local operational guidelines that can mitigate the disruptions experienced by surrounding communities.

We request that you and other elected representatives advocate to the FAA for the reevaluation of the negatively impacting NextGen Flight paths, updated noise abatement guideline responsibilities (i.e. not voluntary but enforceable), mitigate unnecessary low altitude aircraft noise, and encourage courtesy hours of operations such that our local airport operations cease to have detrimental impacts on the health and well being of your constituents.

Goal B: Regional Advocacy - Advocate for the interests of the South Bay.

Background

The California Public Utilities Commission has asked cities to provide comments on proceeding dealing with Investor Owned Utility Wildlife Mitigation Plans by December 15. Palos Verdes Estates City Manager Tony Dahlerbruch asked if the SBCCOG could provide comments on behalf of all of the cities.

Rolling Hills Estates City Manager and Chair of the City Managers' Group, Doug Prichard, sent an e-mail to all of the city managers asking if they wanted to provide comments. No other responses were received.

The comment from the Palos Verdes Estates City Manager was as follows: The Peninsula is a Very High Fire Safety Zone so the CPUC discussion is relevant to us. Assuming that we'd bleed into other cities in a fire scenario and/or call on mutual aid, it could be a regional issue.

I have repeatedly heard frustration that SCE spends lots of money replacing, raising, and upgrading their overhead lines but won't use the money instead to underground those lines. Moreover, not only does it take forever to underground, they charge a lot of money. Maybe we could advocate that the CPUC require SCE with its telecom counterparts to underground or have them give cities the option of applying and supplementing their replacement and upgrading money for undergrounding. Another thought...Change the rules for Rule 20A and Rule 20B to make the funds eligible for undergrounding anywhere (not just in certain circumstances like along arterials).

Brainstorming...SCE will hack and top trees that get close to lines. I'm not aware they do much else. Maybe SCE could be compelled to work with and contribute to cities and our Fire Departments to provide fire safety weed abatement, tree replacement and in general, landscape management. For example, we have aged big trees that are some of the worst in a fire (pine, eucalyptus and palms). If we had more \$\$, we might be able to replace them with young, different (more fire resistant) trees or have a more aggressive trimming program, thus thinning and replacing the existing ripe fuel for a fire.

Finally, I recall that SCE has been resistant to having transformers underground, preferring to have them high on a pole. I believe the CPUC may have given the utility the authority in this matter. Maybe the CPUC in High Fire Safety Zones could require all transformers to be underground at SCE's expense.

RECOMMENDATION

Develop a letter for the SBCCOG to send using the points that are raised above and circulate it to the City Managers for their comments before submission on December 15.

The League of California Cities® appreciates the opportunity to comment on proceeding R. 18-10-007 regarding investor-owned utilities (IOUs) wildfire mitigation plans. Californians rely on energy for basic services and on energy providers to get it to us safely. We appreciate the leadership of the California Public Utilities Commission in addressing the increasingly devastating and destructive wildfires California has faced in recent years.

Local governments across California have long been at the forefront of wildfire and disaster preparedness and response. With the trends of increasing wildfire severity, strengthening safety, and other policies to protect against these disasters are critical.

The League requests that IOUs coordinate with local agencies in their service territory when developing wildfire mitigation plans.

New utility wildfire mitigation plans will have numerous direct effects on local governments, including receipt of notifications, recloser and deenergizing protocols, plans for restoring service, and vegetation management. Specifically, protocols for deenergizing utility lines have important effects on residents, businesses, and city operations. In response to power outages, cities respond by changing traffic signals, a labor-intensive transition that requires city staff time. Local governments are also likely to be affected by any changes in vegetation management procedures and would appreciate the opportunity to work with utilities on changes to such policies. Furthermore, cities and other local governments would like the opportunity to coordinate with utilities to ensure notice is provided to hospitals, businesses, and residents that rely on electrical service.
