SUBJECT: SBHP Eligible Projects in Metro's 2015 Call for Projects

ADHERENCE TO STRATEGIC PLAN:

Goal A: Environment, Transportation and Economic Development. Facilitate, implement and/or educate members and others about environmental, transportation and economic development programs that benefit the South Bay.

BACKGROUND

Metro will be initiating the 2015 Call for Projects in the fall. The SBCCOG may be able to provide cities project development assistance and local matching funds from the South Bay Highway Program (SBHP) if the project would be an eligible use of the Measure R SBHP funds.

The SBCCOG finalized and distributed a proposed schedule of requirements to South Bay Measure R Lead Agencies that want to make use of the SBCCOG's technical and/or financial support in the preparation of applications for Metro's 2015 Call for Projects (CFP.) As of close-of-business on April 30, 2014, the following cities had submitted letters of intent to use the SBCCOG's assistance in preparation for Metro's 2015 Call for Projects: **El Segundo, Gardena, Hermosa Beach, Lawndale, Manhattan Beach, and Torrance.**

The SBCCOG sent out a template form on May 9 requesting those cities listed above to submit a letter from the City Manager to the SBCCOG by May 30 that responded to the information requested in the template form. The information requested on the template form includes: a description of the project(s) that they would like to apply for the 2015 CFP; a request for technical assistance and the initial estimate of the local match they will be requesting from the SBCCOG; a status update of other current SBHP projects and prior CFP projects (e.g.: status of funding agreement(s), funding agreement deadline(s), and the anticipated project completion date for each existing commitment).

The status of each participating city is noted below:

- MRO Committee recommends SBHP budget for inclusion as minimum local match for 2015 CFP applications <u>ON NOV 5, 2014</u>.
- SBCCOG Board approves local match recommended by the MRO Committee (<u>AT THE NOV 20</u> <u>BOARD MEETING.</u>)
- Project applications are completed and submitted by lead agency with local match commitment letter from SBCCOG by Metro's Jan 2015 submittal deadline (date TBD.)

The City of Manhattan Beach is formally requesting Measure R South Bay Highway Program (SBHP) funding to develop and implement a feasibility study for the Sepulveda Boulevard Intersections Improvement Project, which is eligible for Measure R funding.

The City is requesting SBHP funding to accomplish the Project Study Report (PSR)/ Project Study Report Equivalent (PSRE) for improving seven intersections along Sepulveda Boulevard. The seven intersections include the following in priority order: Marine Avenue/Cedar Avenue, Rosecrans Avenue, Valley Drive, 33rd Street, 30th Street, 14th Street and 2nd Street. We believe that by providing a complete PSR/PSRE the success rate of the projects will increase when comes time to compete for funding in the Metro's 2015 Call for Projects.

In July, 2009, Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) and South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG) commissioned Hatch Mott MacDonald to conduct a "User-Based Microanalysis of State Route 1, Pacific Coast Highway" (2009 PCH Study). In the 2009 PCH Study, 30 intersections along the Sepulveda Blvd. in the City of Manhattan Beach have been studied and different levels of improvements have been recommended aiming at relieving traffic congestion along the Sepulveda Corridor. The City has selected seven intersections to be included in this Sepulveda Boulevard Intersections Improvement Project.

Hawthorne Boulevard at 182: Widening of existing roadway within 400 feet of the intersection to construct a new northbound right-turn lane;

Hawthorne Boulevard at Spencer: Widening of Spencer Street east of Hawthorne Boulevard at the north corner;

Hawthorne Boulevard at Emerald: Widening of Spencer Street east of Hawthorne Boulevard at the north corner;

Hawthorne Boulevard at Lomita: Widening of existing roadway within 400 feet of the intersection to construct a new northbound right-turn lane.

The City of Torrance also requests the South Bay Cities Council of Governments to commit the minimum local matching funding for CFP applications for the following projects that are eligible for Measure R SBHP funding. The City understands that the maximum SBHP funding will not exceed the minimum local match required by the Metro 2015 CFP Application Guidelines (as specified in the appropriate CFP project category local match requirement) and that additional local funds may be provided by the City to earn "overmatch" points in the CFP process.

Although more accurate local match commitments will be developed as the project is further developed during the project application development process, the City estimates the magnitude of the SBHP match to be:
