Lomita Water Overview


- 21,000 Residents
- 1.9 Square Miles
- 1 Groundwater Well (owned and operated by L.A. County until the early 90's)
- 4,300 connections (94% Residential)
- 4 Pressure Zones

- 43 miles of water mains
- 70% of the City's water distribution pipes were installed between 1928 and 1940
- 797 valves, 470 hydrants, and
 55 flushing points
- 2 pressure-reducing stations
- 1 booster pump station

- 2 Reservoirs
 - One 5.3-million-gallon
 - One 100,000-gallon
 - 3 Emergency interconnections
 - Two with the City of Torrance
 - One with Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP)



Zone Map and Facilities Map



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
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

1539 increase since 1990 (~8%)




Primary Areas for Future Development





 - Planning/siting projects to maximize resources and minimize deman









