III. Consent Calendar

MOTION by Committee Member Uphoff, seconded by Committee Member Tanaka, to **APPROVE** the consent calendar. Approved without objections.

IV. SBCCOG Transportation Working Group Updates

A. Infrastructure Working Group - Mr. Leger reported that the Infrastructure Working Group primarily focused on the Measure R program update.

B. Transit Operators Working Group - Mr. Leger reported that the working group was dark in February.

C. Metro Service Council - Mr. Szerlip shared that the new schedule of meeting on the first Monday of the month at 5 p.m. is now in effect. He also reported that the group discussed the June service changes which are affected by the 2026 World Cup, with Metro requiring union approval to implement these changes. Mr. Szerlip also shared that the Metro Service Council has opted out of participating in Senate Bill 707, a bill that requires eligible legislative bodies to provide an opportunity for public participation via two-way telephonic or audiovisual services. Committee Chair Pimentel asked about the reconciliation of systems with Metro borrowing buses from many different agencies and jurisdictions, referencing different charging formulations, access tap codes, and driver certifications. Mr. Szerlip noted that this would be under the control of the Olympic Committee, not Metro, and shared that the J Line is now over 50% Electric.

D. Caltrans District 7 - Agency Updates - Ms. Juharyan reported that there were no major updates, and the draft 2026 SHOPP is published online. Ms. Juharyan also shared that there was a hearing on February 5 for the southern region, with projects likely being moved forward for CTC approval in March.

V. Measure R South Bay Highway Program FY26-27 Program

Measure R is the third countywide sales tax approved for transportation programs, and it includes the South Bay Highway Program which is administered by the subregion. In 2018, SBCCOG asked Metro to transfer \$400 million of unspent money to create the South Bay Transit Investment Program.

Mr. Leger shared that SBCCOG completes one-on-one meetings with the cities annually to check in on their projects. This year, the SBCCOG received three applications for three projects, with one of them being the county's ITS improvements on Hawthorne Blvd, Normandie Ave, Manhattan Beach Blvd. In this project, the Measure R funds were a local match, with the county requesting an additional funding share of \$3.421 million to cover an increase in construction costs. The next application was for two separate approvals within the same construction project, an integrated corridor management project led by Metro on the I-105 freeway. This project has been in the planning and design phase and moving into construction and has requested an additional \$3.65 million in additional funds. Mr. Leger shared that Caltrans' requirement of an independent quality assurance (IQA) was not necessary for this project, so the agency has requested that \$150,000 programmed towards the IQA be de-obligated.

The 3 applications together lead to a recommendation for \$4.5 million in additional Measure R funding if approved. Mr. Leger shared that this would equate to \$47.8 million available for future cycles until 2039. Ms. Bacharach clarified that at the end of Measure R in 2039, Measure M will increase to a full cent sales tax.

Committee Chair Pimentel asked if the I-105 corridor project was under-scoped. Mr. Leger replied that it was initially over-scoped and that Metro has also dealt with inflation, being a 6-year-old project.

Committee Member Yoon asked if this is the first time Metro has requested an increase in the budget for the I-105 freeway project. Mr. Leger shared that Metro requested additional funding one other time to add portions of the I-405 freeway into the project.

Ms. Bacharach noted that there has not been adequate record keeping of the funding histories of projects, so she plans on implementing a process to ensure that funding histories can be traced for all Measure R and M projects.

The group discussed and agreed to request funding history information for the three Measure R projects at the February Board meeting.

MOTION by Committee Member Uphoff, seconded by Committee Member Tanaka, to recommend approval of the Measure R SBHP update and projects by the Board and to also request additional funding history information for the three Measure R projects. Approved without objections.

VI. Measure M Multi-Year Subregional Programs Performance Audit Update

Mr. Leger shared that for the first time Metro has initiated an audit for the Measure M program. It was noted that the audit is occurring approximately a year before the decennial transfer opportunity. SBCCOG staff recently attended a kickoff meeting with the consultant auditors. Mr. Leger clarified that the auditors will not be corresponding with any of the cities. SBCCOG staff shared recommendations with the auditors to streamline Metro's administrative process and pointed out weak points that cause delays for projects.

Committee Chair Pimentel asked for an overview of Measure M as a reminder to the group. Mr. Leger shared that Measure M was approved in 2016 and is the fourth sales tax approved for transportation in the county, which also includes subregional programs. Measure M can fund pedestrian, first-last mile, and active transportation projects.

Mr. Leger also shared that a reviewing subcommittee will evaluate Measure M applications due to an increase in applications this year and that funding that may not be available for every application submitted. In addition, Measure M funds the local allocation program which addresses geographic equity concerns by providing funding to each city.

Mr. Leger clarified that this is a performance audit, so it does not address the financial aspects of the program but will instead identify ways to expedite and smooth out the funding process.

Committee Member Yoon asked if Metro completes any audits annually. Mr. Leger replied that Metro completes financial audits every year, but this is the first performance audit of the function of the MSP programs.

Committee Member Uphoff asked if there is an opportunity at the close of this audit for a report that recommends best practices. Mr. Leger replied that he does expect a report with findings and addressing concerns from the subregions.

VII. Roundtable Discussion on Spotlight Presentations for 2026

Mr. Leger shared that the SBCCOG is working to secure a transportation Olympics-related presentation.

Committee Chair Pimentel mentioned an interest in autonomous vehicles or transportation, referencing Waymo's services.

Committee Member Uphoff referenced the Cal City's Transportation Communication Public Works Policy Committee meeting, where a Caltrans representative spoke on the road change program. This refers to the increase in electric vehicles and the loss of sales tax revenue. Mr. Szerlip mentioned the proposed mileage tax to make up the losses from electric vehicles and the lack of information on how this process would work.

VIII. Three Month Look-Ahead – Received and filed

Mr. Leger shared that Metro will be delivering an update on the 2028 Games Mobility Concept Plan and Caltrans will be giving a Vincent Thomas Bridge update in March.

IX. Announcements

Ms. Bacharach shared that there are three openings on the service council for three-year terms. Every year, three terms expire, but council members are not term limited. The deadline to apply is March 20, 2026.

Committee Member Obagi shared that there was a member of the Metro Service Council who was very disruptive at the Metro Board Meeting and engaged in foul language online towards him. He noted that at the city level, the city council has the authority to remove commissioners who they feel do not best represent the city. He then recommended that the SBCCOG create a process to remove appointees from the service council if necessary, rather than waiting for them to finish their term.

Ms. Bacharach noted that the SBCCOG may request removal of a council member but asked Metro staff if there is an existing process to have a member removed. Mr. Bohlke shared that the Metro Board has authority

over the service councils, and he will look into the disciplinary processes that exist.

Ms. Bacharach shared that SB 220 did not pass, which was the bill to reconstitute the membership of the Metro Board due to the expansion of the Board of Supervisors, but Metro decided to create a board of composition of their own. While the ad hoc committee that was being created included interest groups such as a labor representative, there was no representation from the subregions. Terry Dipple, Executive Director of the Las Virgenes-Malibu COG, was able to get himself appointed by the Metro Chair, and he will represent the subregions in the Ad Hoc Board Composition Committee.

X. Adjournment: Committee Chair Pimentel adjourned the meeting at 11:35 a.m. to March 9 at 10:30 a.m.

Federal

U.S. Transportation Secretary Sean P. Duffy Updates Electric Vehicle (EV) Charger Program to Include “Buy America” Requirements

The U.S. Department of Transportation announced updates to its electric vehicle charging public interest waiver to incorporate expanded “Buy America” requirements. The revised guidance is intended to increase the share of domestically manufactured components used in federally funded EV charging infrastructure. This raises the required domestic content of EV chargers with the public interest waiver from 55 percent to 100 percent, reflecting a broader federal emphasis on strengthening U.S. supply chains and supporting domestic industry.

The update is designed to ensure that public investments in charging infrastructure contribute to American manufacturing while continuing to support the buildout of a national charging network. The policy builds on existing domestic content rules and signals a continued focus on aligning infrastructure spending with economic development priorities within the United States.

Once the updated waiver is finalized, this requirement will be immediately applicable to federally funded EV charging projects. This further highlights the approach to balancing infrastructure goals with domestic production requirements as EV adoption continues to grow nationwide.

State

California Allocates Nearly \$1 Billion for Safety, Transit, and Climate-Focused Transportation Improvements

The California Transportation Commission has announced that they have allocated nearly \$1 billion to transportation projects across the state aimed at improving safety, expanding transit, and supporting climate goals. The funding package, supported by state and federal sources, is part of ongoing efforts under Governor Gavin Newsom’s infrastructure plans to modernize California’s transportation network and improve mobility statewide.

The \$988.7 million investment includes funding from the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and Senate Bill 1, with projects designed to enhance goods movement, improve transit and rail systems, and expand walking and biking infrastructure. State officials emphasized that these investments are intended to strengthen economic connectivity while making transportation systems safer and more resilient to climate impacts.

Several projects will directly benefit Southern California and the Los Angeles region, as \$54 million was awarded to fund repairs on SR-2 and SR-27 from damage caused by erosion and

fires. \$49 million was also allocated to a 16-mile Capital Preventative Maintenance project on Pacific Coast Highway near Malibu, which will deliver ADA-compliant pedestrian features and bike lanes in several locations, in addition to 63.4 lane miles of resurfaced roadway. Additionally, funding for the region includes support for improvements to bus services across Los Angeles County.

State transportation leaders noted that the funding package supports a wide range of improvements from bridge repairs and highway upgrades to transit vehicles and active transportation infrastructure. This reflects a continued focus on safety, accessibility, and long-term system resilience across California.

Region

Congress Approves \$94.3 Million for Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games

Congress has approved approximately \$94.3 million in mobility-related funding to support transportation planning and improvements tied to the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games, marking a significant step in preparing the region's transportation network for the global event. The funding was included in a federal transportation spending package and is intended to help agencies coordinate operations, enhance mobility, and improve access to venues across Los Angeles County.

Regional leaders, including LA Metro, have emphasized that the investment will support planning and operational strategies needed to manage increased travel demand during the Games. This funding will help Metro continue to work on the Games Enhanced Transit System (GETS), including early service planning, initial land leasing, designing temporary bus facilities, and improving station experiences. It will also support final design and engineering for station upgrades, mobility hubs, light rail improvements, the Games Route Network, and quick-build pedestrian improvements around event venues. This will help advance mobility initiatives aimed at improving connectivity, reliability, and the overall transportation experience for residents and visitors.

The allocation reflects continued coordination between federal and regional partners as Los Angeles prepares for the influx of athletes, spectators, and workers expected in 2028. Officials say the funding will help ensure the region can deliver a transportation system capable of supporting a large-scale international event while also providing longer-term mobility benefits for local communities.

Trends

Uber Prepares to Launch Robotaxis in Los Angeles

Uber Technologies has announced a new suite of services aimed at supporting autonomous ride-hailing operations as the company prepares to introduce robotaxis in Los Angeles. The initiative, called Uber Autonomous Solutions, is designed to give autonomous vehicle developers access to Uber's customer base, software tools, and operational infrastructure to help scale deployments more efficiently.

The company is working with several partners as part of its broader strategy to expand autonomous mobility. Through a partnership with Volkswagen, Uber plans to launch a shared robotaxi service using the electric ID, with testing already underway. Uber has also outlined additional collaborations with companies such as Waymo, Lucid Motors, and Nuro.

Rather than developing its own autonomous driving technology, Uber is increasingly positioning itself as a platform provider that connects riders with partner-operated autonomous fleets. The company says this approach allows vehicle developers to focus on technology while leveraging Uber's established marketplace and trip data to support operations.

The announcement comes amid growing competition in the robotaxi sector, with companies including Tesla and Waymo continuing to expand testing and service areas. Uber's recent investments in charging infrastructure and platform tools reflect a broader industry trend toward the support of autonomous ride-hailing, particularly in major urban centers like Los Angeles.
